Discussion of SHIP implementation	Is there anything that you would add to the list of the ways that the public health system could help in the implementation of the SHIP?	
practices	 Anita: The state could put out issues that are important as well as a model of care that would have an impact on that issue. Andrea: IDPH is the backbone organization that will facilitate the work, determine what our focus areas are, based on the SHIP, and make sure that there is a process in place to accomplish the goals collectively, regardless of funding. Leticia: This plan is for the whole public health system, which includes all partners, therefore we need to discuss a framework that utilizes all of our organization's actionable roles. Andrea: The "owner" of the plan is the state of Illinois. What activities need to take place in order to assess whether progress is happening under SHIP	

 implementation? Sandy: Add "nuanced analysis, collective measurement and accountability of data to lead efforts" to third bullet of proactive roles. Leticia: We need to start thinking from an infrastructure mindset rather than a programmatic mindset. Even if we do not have the resources and are unable to start new 	
 programs, we can still make a case for infrastructure. The state, with partnerships, has a capacity and obligation to collect and disseminate data in a way that can be used by advocates to reshape policy and advocate resources. Determine how the state health department is structured, funded, and functions in a way that aligns with the SHIP and carries out the priorities in the future. Leticia: The goals should serve as a roadmap for payers to see where work is being done and provide opportunities for organizations to join efforts to continue work around the priorities. 	
• Reframe evidence-based practices; not everything has to be done by randomized clinical trials. Should including our population in decision making be part of our criteria? • It should just help frame how we are going to make the goals actionable. • That will play more into the strategies that we will take; how community will play a role in achieving our goals. In thinking about the role of the public health system in implementing the SHIP, what kind of interventions should be considered as statewide? • Both policy and programs. What criteria are most important and why? • We should strive for strategies that meet all of the criteria in some way.
